SONNING COMMON COMMUNITY EVIDENCE

This comprises three sets of information which sought, in different ways and at different times, local community views on Sonning Common as it is now and as it might or should be:

- 1. **Community Survey**: This asked for comments on a wide range of issues so can be drawn upon to support each (and all) of the plan policies.
- 2. **Design Day**: This also asked for comments on a wide range of issues so can be drawn upon to support each (and all) of the plan policies.
- 3. **Facilities Survey**: This focused specifically on future sport, recreation and leisure provision.

1. COMMUNITY SURVEY

In 2010 a Community Survey was undertaken to assess community views on a range of issues, several but not all planning-related. The responses are in summary form as follows.

The survey was distributed to **1800 homes** (i.e. more than just the parish) with a **78%** response rate.

TOP 3 Priorities

- Improve Village Centre/Environment
- Parking
- Pavements and Pathways

HOUSING

- 81% favour small housing developments on a number of sites
- 67% believe that a 40% mix of any new homes should be "affordable" ones.

VILLAGE CENTRE

- 82% believe the village centre needs to be re-modelled
- 70% say "plant some trees"
- A clear majority want to keep the raised flower-beds
- At least 50% say re-open the public toilets
- 35% want more frequent road repairs

PARKING

- 91% do not want to pay for parking
- 68% favour a ban on parking in Wood Lane
- 34% want enforced parking restrictions

ROAD SAFETY

- 68% want a zebra crossing on Wood Lane close to the shops
- 55% want footpaths in Reades Lane
- Hazardous roads: Wood Lane (20%), Grove Rd. (17%) and Kennylands Road (61%)

LAW AND ORDER: Top Priorities for police action:

- Inconsiderate parking (26%)
- Vandalism (19%)
- Anti-social behaviour (15%)
- 54% believe policing levels are poor or inadequate
- 45% are in Neighbourhood Watch and a further 22% keen to join
- Less than 20% have been the victims of a crime in the last 3 years

2. DESIGN DAY

This section includes all the 'raw', i.e. initial results from the Design Day held in April 2012 to which all local residents were invited. All text in italics, as here, is introduction and explanation, all plain text is typed-up notes or comments direct from participants.

WHY DID YOU CHOOSE TO LIVE IN SONNING COMMON?

For this exercise, people were asked to note down their reasons for moving to Sonning Common. Comments have been grouped, all are noted here.

Countryside/Amenities

TRAFFIC WORKSHOP

During the day a workshop was held with a small number of local people about traffic and movement around the village. This was led by Geoff Haslam of the Localism Network. What follows is his notes so all are in italics.

Introduction

There was a short introduction to the theory of 'walkable neighbourhoods', including the concept of permeability, block size, and 5 and 10 minute walking isographs. Attendees were invited to indicate their travel routes from home to the village facilities and to wider destinations. They were then invited to mark up plans showing the above and any issues that they perceived on these routes. The results were plotted on a village map including the key destinations and the issues. There were initial discussions about the type of solution that may be possible to address some issues.

Issues included:

- Narrow pavements and alleyways
- Condition of the pavements, gutters and road paving
- Busy roads and perceived danger for pedestrians and cyclists (Kennylands Road and particularly Peppard Road)
- Parking for shoppers using the centre
- Limited accessibility through the village due to narrow pavements and alleyways.
- Adults dropping off children at the primary school (many come from other villages, beyond walking or cycling distance)
- The bus service, lack of shelters, frequency, short day, and routing
- The work identified two 'centres'; one on Wood Lane; the other on Peppard Road. Both benefit
 from users coming from outlying villages. The Peppard Road Petrol Station, car showroom, bank,
 etc. benefit from passing traffic. One of the participants drew the 5 and 10 minute walk limits on
 the village map.

Suggestions:

- 1. It was agreed that the area in front of the Village Hall, the location of many of the shops, would benefit from a redesign; this may include the improvement of pavements running up to it, and measures to increase pedestrian priority incrementally towards the centre.
- 2. A pavement and cycle track to be added to Peppard Road to facilitate movement around the village and create a cycle commuting opportunity into Reading.
- 3. The parents association at Sonning Common Primary School are keen to address the issue of danger generated by children being dropped off and picked up by car. A potential solution could follow similar principles to those suggested for the village centre.

3. COMMUNITY SURVEY OF SPORT AND RECREATION ASPIRATIONS

In 2014 the Neighbourhood Plan Working Group issued a survey questionnaire about sport and recreation provision, entitled 'On Your Bike', to local residents via the Parish Newsletter. 128 responses were received. The results are summarised below.
